## A Christmas Bible Reading:

#### The Birth of Jesus



2 In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. <sup>2</sup> (This was the first census that took place while<sup>[a]</sup> Quirinius was governor of Syria.) <sup>3</sup> And everyone went to their own town to register.

<sup>4</sup> So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. <sup>5</sup> He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. <sup>6</sup> While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, <sup>7</sup> and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.

<sup>8</sup> And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. <sup>9</sup> An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. <sup>10</sup> But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. <sup>11</sup> Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. <sup>12</sup> This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger."

<sup>13</sup> Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying,

<sup>14</sup> "Glory to God in the highest heaven,

and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests."

<sup>15</sup> When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."

<sup>16</sup> So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger. <sup>17</sup> When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, <sup>18</sup> and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them. <sup>19</sup> But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. <sup>20</sup> The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told.

## Christingle celebrations in St Columba's Swords:



On the evening of Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> December, Stephen Vincent held a Christingle Service of joyful celebration that brings families and communities together to share the light of Jesus and spread a message of hope.

Some 40 children attended and had great fun whilst also spreading the good news of Jesus Christ. The Christmas festivities within the Parish was very much enjoyed by all who attended, both young and old.

Christingle celebrations are named after the Christingles that are lit during the ceremony. Christingles are oranges wrapped in red tape, decorated with dried fruit or sweets, with a candle on the top.

During the service, each person takes a Christingle and the candles are all lit to create a warm, magical glow symbolising the light of Christ and bringing hope to people living in darkness.

Christingles are made using oranges and a few other bits, as you choose. You light the candle at the end of a service to spread a magical glow around everyone.

Each element of a Christingle has a special meaning and helps to tell the Christian story:

The orange represents the world

The red ribbon (or tape) symbolises the love and blood of Christ

The sweets and dried fruit represent all of God's creations

The lit candle represents Jesus's light in the world, bringing hope to people living in darkness.

## Baptism and Service of Remembrance

## Amazing work from the "Friends of Clonmethan" & commemorating those lost in war

On Saturday the 11th November, the friends of Clonmethan, arranged a remembrance occasion at



St Mary's Church, which closed in 1952. A great turnout of dignitaries and locals, and thankfully the sun shone. First in the running order was an unveiling of a plaque outside the main gate. Designed by Susan Flatley, it gives a short history of the site and links to this website.

The second event involved the cutting of a ribbon by Archbishop Michael Jackson and Minster of Housing and

TD Darragh O'Brien. Work was completed restoring the old tower on the Church and making it safe for future generations to enjoy and value.



Then at the rear of the Church, to mark Remembrance Day, the proceedings moved to a new monument to locals who died in the two world wars. Local poet Miriam Andrews read the <u>poem</u> Two Minutes Silence aloud, and wreaths were laid by Archbishop Jackson and Minister O'Brien. Local historian Paddy Finnegan did a roll call, which was followed by the last post played by James J McCaffery on bugle. Archbishop Jackson also gave a short oration.

In addition to those mentioned, the day's events were also attended by Adrian Henchy, Mayor of Fingal, and councillors Cathal Boland, Brian Dennehy, Larry Urell, Kim Rice conservation archaeologist, and Christine Baker, Heritage Officer FCC.

#### Rev Fredrick Aldhouse – St Mary's Clonmethan



Revd Fredrick Aldhouse was a respected poet and started his Ministry in St Mary's Church, Clonmethan in 1914. He was born in 1873 in Dublin and attended Trinity College receiving his BA in 1898 and MA in 1901.

Not long after he served as a Chaplain in The First World War in France, seeing what must have been horrific events. After the war he travelled to India and then returned to London in 1919, receiving the British War Medal. He returned to Clonmethan in

1919 serving there as Rector until his death in 1949.

Many other now-famous individuals served in World War 1, including Ernest Heminway, Edwin Hubble, Humphrey Bogart and JR Tolkien, author of the Lord of The Rings. His experience in WW1 inspired some of the images, we see in his now famous movies.

Rev Aldhouse penned this poem, which although sad, we should honour and remember his memory and contribution as a fellow member of our Parish. In 2021 Archbishop Michael Jackson, visited St Mary's and blessed Revd Aldhouse's grave, which is located in the Church grounds, which are so kindly maintained by the friends of Clonmethan.

## St David's Church, Kilsallaghan, Co. Dublin





When we think of our parish, it is normal for us to think of St Columba's Swords or St Patrick's Donabate, but we would be wise to remember our smaller Church in Kilsallaghan. This Church is a centuries-old church on an even more ancient ecclesiastical site. The Church is complemented by a magnificent <u>stained-glass window</u> which was commissioned by Harry Clarke, the stainedglass artist of An Túr Gloine fame, and was assembled by Michael Heaney (1873-1941), a pupil of Clarke's.

Saint David's Church receives great support from non-Church of Ireland people who live in the locality. The annual Carol Service held each December is notably a celebration for the whole community in this tranquil rural place of worship.

In writing this Newsletter, on behalf of the Parishioners and Vestry, I would like to recognise and extend a note of thanks to Andy Anderson, and Ian and Fran Falkner, who do such outstanding work to keep the Church alive with regular fund raising events and in caring for the Church.

During a recent visit to the Church, I came across a Bible, which was gift from St Columba's Vestry Swords, to Rose Cuthbert. This instantly catapulted me back to my early childhood when attending the "Old" Old Borough School, on Main Street, Swords. Rose Cuthbert used to provide us with religious education and also

Sunday School. A wonderful lady, who returned to the Lord in 1997; her grave is located in St. David's graveyard. I would recommend a visit to St David's Church; a service of Holy Communion takes places once a month.

The Church of Ireland Theological Institute, provides academic training with a Certificate in Christian Theology and Practice, which is run with Trinity Collage Dublin.
